Julie Packard – She Holds the Keys to the Aquarium

A Conservationist, Philanthropist, a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, a recipient of the Audubon Medal and a creator of the legendary Monterey Bay Aquarium, in her capacity as Executive Director of the Aquarium, Julie Packard, will speak to CRA members and guests about the

Marine Sanctuary Foundation and was named a California Coastal Hero by the California Coastal Commission and Sunset Magazine.

Julie Packard is a native Northern Californian. From her early girlhood days she learned to cherish the freedom of the outdoors. She planted vegetable gardens along with her father, David Packard, the co-founder of Hewlett-Packard. As a college student in biology at the University of California, Santa Cruz, she was credited with a “wide open, inquisitive mind”.

The Monterey Bay Aquarium is arguably one of the great aquariums in the world and is known on the Peninsula as the must-see attraction when visitors and guests

arrive to bask in the beauty of the region.

This from the MBA talk sheet: “The ocean sustains all life on earth. From the air we breathe to the seafood we eat; our very survival depends on healthy seas.

The aquarium’s conservation and science programs are tracking some of the most critical issues affecting ocean health. We bring decades of expertise and relationships in ocean science, policy and markets to the task.”

The CRA welcomes Julie Packard to the Sunset Center’s Carpenter Hall on March 18, 2020. We suggest you arrive early; we believe this will be a well-attended event. ■

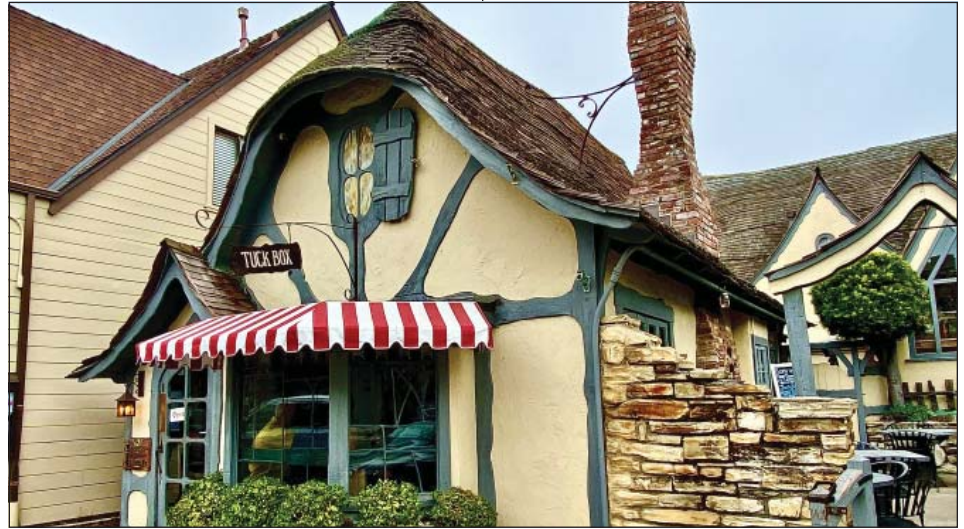

CRA Village Engagement System

The CRA's new Village Engagement System (VES) website is in the final stages of development and testing and is scheduled for launch in March. We hope it will live up to its name while becoming a go-to site for our community to stay informed about important Carmel information. It will also provide a way to start or renew your membership, maintain your CRA profile, register and pay for CRA events and encourage volunteer activities.

You will be receiving an online notification personalized for you when the VES is launched. It will contain your assigned User Name and instructions on how to log in to select your password and complete your User Profile. It will provide basic functionality to non-members but will provide additional functions over time when you log in as a CRA Member.

VES is a significant but highly cost-effective system being implemented by CRA volunteers with the long-term goal of improving community engagement while adding internal efficiencies for our growing membership. We hope that you will be patient as we learn, make adjustments and add new capabilities. Several CRA members have been trained to be "Customer Support" for those who need personalized instruction. The One That Got Away...

With a presidential election later this year, today's question is: which U.S. Presidents have visited the Monterey Peninsula and Carmel-by-the-Sea? This is the story of the one that did not come.

In a telegram to Franklin D. Roosevelt on 15 March 1934 encouraging a presidential journey to the Monterey Peninsula that summer, Carmel mayor John Catlin noted that Presidents Harrison,

3436 extending an invitation "...of welcoming (to) the Chief Executive of the nation to our local shores." The Council's action also authorized Teaby to seek appointees of a "representative committee of citizens of the Monterey Peninsula for the purpose of inducing our President to visit us during his proposed summer voyage." Monterey's City Clerk, Clyde Dorsey, dispatched the invitation in a letter to

FDR on 9 March. The Monterey Bay Area League of Municipalities and the Castroville Chamber of Commerce approved their own endorsements during March.

After receiving authorization from the city council the night before, at 10:30 a.m. on Thursday, 15 March, Mayor John Catlin of Carmel sent a telegram to the President which stated that Carmel "would be more than honored by a visit from you" and "expressing

the heartfelt desire of our whole people..." to have the Chief Executive come to the Peninsula.

Catlin received a responding letter from Marvin McIntyre, Assistant Secretary to the President, dated 21 March, which read "The President asks me to acknowledge receipt of and thank you for your telegram of March fifteenth and through you to express his thanks..... for the cordial invitation to visit the Monterey Peninsula. He appreciates your thoughtfulness and will keep it in mind should there be an opportunity to accept your hospitality."

Pursuant to his Council's direction as contained in Resolution 3436, Monterey Mayor Teaby appointed a planning committee chaired by Allen Griffin,

publisher of the Monterey Peninsula Herald. Some of the notables on the committee were S. F. B. Morse, Mayor Catlin, Perry Newberry, Mrs. Sidney Fish, Pacific Grove Mayor Sheldon Gilmer, attorney Carmel Martin, and business and labor leaders from the Peninsula and county.



Griffin sent a letter to FDR on behalf of the committee on 13 March and received a response dated 28 March from M.A. (Missy) LeHand, private secretary to the President, stating that plans had not been finalized. News reports in mid-April announced that Roosevelt would commence a western trip on 23 June in Annapolis with stops in the Virgin Islands, San Juan, Puerto Rico, then through the Panama Canal to the Pacific Ocean and on to Hawaii.

Local elected leaders and committee members continued to provide enthusiastic reports to the press and to the communities, led by publisher Griffin who convened a committee meeting on 19 April for planning "a renewed campaign to bring the president to Monterey..." The mayors collectively sent a telegram to Roosevelt at the end of April which closed by stating "When you come to the Pacific coast next summer we hope to greet you at Monterey..." Mayor Teaby sent a personal telegram to the White House, receiving a non-committal response from McIntyre on 1 May.

On 14 May, a story in the Herald reported Mrs. Roosevelt might accompany the President to the West Coast. The White House announcement in mid-May that FDR would visit the Pacific Northwest after departing Hawaii did not dampened hopes or quell exuberance but actually provided "good reason to hope that Mr. Roosevelt will accept invitations to visit the Monterey Peninsula this summer."

The truth became known on 12 July when Roosevelt was deep into his journey. "President's Itinerary Does Not Include Monterey Visit" read the Herald's headline. ■

On 20 January 1934, press reports originating from the White House indicated that FDR was considering a trip to California, Puerto Rico and Hawaii by ship later in the year. William Sorensen, a merchant in New Monterey, conceived the idea to invite FDR to the Peninsula as a stop on the presidential tour. Mayor W.L. Teaby of Monterey began working with the mayors of other cities and the Monterey Bay Area League of Municipalities to initiate a united effort to invite the President.

On 6 March, the Monterey City Council unanimously passed Resolution

His Business Is Show Business

Mention his name and the local theater scene from Pac Rep to the Forest Theater and most locals will know this fellow. This guy is one exuberant, talented artist by the name of Walter De Faria, known to most of us as Walt. We met over coffee for a delightful conversation all about, what else? Show business.

So, here is a man who has seemingly done it all.

■ *Walt, you've spent most of your life in and around the entertainment business, from theater, to movies, to television. Some of those years, twenty or so, have been right here in Carmel. But, where did your career start and where, early on, did you ply your trade?*

Well, it started when I was about seven years old. I used to flip a card table on its side, hang Christmas lights on the frame, turn on the radio and borrow my

sister's dolls to create plays and dramas, I was in business.

As a young guy after the Second World War and Korea I decided I wanted to be on the stage or behind the stage. When I was quite young, I wanted to be a dancer and a singer. The dancer wish never came about, and, guess what, just like all boys, my voice changed, so a career as a singer was over before it began. My very brief career as a stage performer ended. Not to be down-hearted, I moved backstage and there I have been for many years. How many? Well, I've been in Carmel for twenty and I've produced and directed over twenty shows in that time.

■ *What's the Fresno story? You spent some time there.*

I did. It was early television. I was hired by the McClatchy people to open a TV studio. We, just a few of us, were starting from scratch.

What we knew we had to learn on the job. We wrote the scripts, delivered the news, performed in the commercials, manned the cameras, and drove our battered cars anywhere to get a scoop on a local story. Looking back, I don't know how we did it, but what a wonderful introduction to what became one of my most successful jobs.

Then from Fresno it was on to the big time in LA where I began directing commercials. Then back to the Bay Area where I met a young producer who got a break with Charles Schultz. I found

myself in the midst of producing the first of the Schultz Charlie Brown specials for television. "Charlie Brown's Christmas" was the first of many in the series. It was a wonderful experience and the shows were big hits.

■ *We all have our favorite stars. Over the years you must have worked with many in the profession, from stage and screen. Is there someone with whom you had a special personal relationship, one that you're especially grateful for?*

Yes, I've been lucky to have worked with many actors, writers and directors. I think my most significant alliance was with the actor/writer, Carl Reiner. He was such a pleasure just to be around, to collaborate with and to learn from. And yet over the years I met and worked with many in the business. In hindsight, almost without exception, working with and for important actors and directors was positive and gratifying. I was just happy to be there.

■ *There's a rumor floating around the Village that you're about to take a final curtain call. Is retirement in your near future? With your energy and talents there must be something on your mind. So, here's a final question: what's next, Walt?*

I'm retired as we speak. But, I guess I'm not retired—yet. The Forest Guild has asked me to do one more gig, and that's "Annie." Lots of kids, lots of moving bodies around stage. And this time I'm going to have a co-director and a choreographer, at last. Look, I've retired about five times so I don't know what will happen. Oh, I'll do something. I always do.

Retirement? For Walt DeFaria? We doubt it. Thanks for spending this time with us. CRA will be looking for your next—whatever. ■

CERT Training

Interested in contributing to the betterment of your town? The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) is training and educating volunteers in disaster preparedness for hazards that may impact our area.

Participants will be taught basic disaster response skills such as fire safety, light search and rescue, and medical necessities.

Using the training learned in the classroom and during exercises, CERT members will be able to assist their families, their neighbors and in the workplace following an event when professional responders are not available at the scene.

CERT also participates in searches for missing persons; it serves as coastal spotters for persons swept out to sea and other emergencies. Classes are taught in Monterey. Interested individuals may enroll by emailing training@montereycert.org.

Included with the staff's presentation was a plan for a bike lane as well. Participants left the meeting with a greater understanding of the project.

Hopefully, the long-overdue San Carlos Street improvements project will gain the support it needs to come to fruition.
